Child Safety and Cultural Safety Risk Management

Swimable is committed to the safety and wellbeing of children and young people who are a part of our customer base and community. As a part of our active approach to child safety and cultural safety, we have developed and adopted the following template to contribute to the development and continuous improvement of a child safe culture through active risk management.

Principles and Guidelines

The following table outline the principal elements of risk management:

Principle	Definition and Consideration
Identify	Identify where, when, why, and how certain types of risks may happen.
Analyse	Determine the likelihood of the risks to occur, how they may occur, and the potential consequences related to these risks.
Evaluate	Comparing the level of risk and the level of adversity in outcome so that decisions can be made on prevention and education
Control	Develop and implement action plans and strategies that centre on how to mitigate said risks and manage them if they occur
Monitor and communicate	Monitor the effectiveness of the process put in place for risk management. Regularly review these processes and update if and when necessary. Communicate the risk management plan to all Staff, volunteers, and the parents/guardians of children to educate them on the processes.
Consult	Regularly accept feedback from the Swimable community and review processes to ensure this feedback is being addressed properly within the set framework.

Child Safety and Cultural Safety Risks

Swimable takes child safety and cultural safety risks very seriously. Before developing the strategies to mitigate risks, it is important to highlight the probable risks with reference to child safety and cultural safety.

Risk matrix

Swimable has used the following Risk Matrix to analyse and determine the risk levels of identified risks:

Risk management strategies


